ETHICAL RATIONALISM VS ETHICAL SENTIMENTALISM Thomas Schmidt and Michael Smith

OVERVIEW

Ethical Rationalism vs Ethical Sentimentalism is a two-part graduate course, taught by Thomas Schmidt (Humboldt University, Berlin) and Michael Smith (Princeton University). One part will be on ethical rationalism, and it will take place in Berlin in mid-June 2016. The second part will be on ethical sentimentalism, and it will take place in Princeton at the end of August and beginning of September 2016.

There is funding for travel, accommodation, and some meal costs for six students from Princeton to join Michael Smith in Berlin for the first part of the course, and six students from Berlin to join Thomas Schmidt in Princeton for the second part of the course. The twelve students who receive funding must attend *both* parts of the course. Over and above these twelve students, local students and faculty are welcome to attend each part of the course, however only the twelve students will receive credit. The reading for the course will be made available online in advance. The expectation is that all students and faculty attending the course will have read all of the material prior to attending.

At the end of each part of the course, there will be one half of the annual Humboldt-Princeton Graduate Conference in Philosophy. Each half will take place in one day. The papers to be presented there do not need to address topics related to the graduate course, though of course they may do so. Unlike in previous years, the Graduate Conference will not be organized by graduate students, but will instead be organized by Thomas Schmidt and Michael Smith.

STRUCTURE

Both courses will run for six days each, with a three-hour seminar on each day, followed by the graduate conference.

- (i) a statement of motivation (one page single spaced maximum) giving the reasons why they would profit from attending the course, and
- (ii) a proposal for a paper (half a page single spaced maximum) that they could, if selected, present at the graduate conference.

Those eligible to apply are final year BA students, M.A. students, and Ph.D. students.

Thomas Schmidt and Michael Smith will jointly evaluate all applications.

Final decisions will be made by the Chair of the Institute for Philosophy at the Humboldt, and the Director of Graduate Studies in Philosophy at Princeton.

The deadline for applications is Friday 22 January 2016.
