Practical Normativity: Reasons is the first of three Summer Institutes, organized by Michael Smith (Princeton) and Thomas Schmidt (Humboldt), that will take place over the years 2018-2020 —at Princeton (2018), at ANU (2019), and at HU Berlin (2020)—funded by grants from the Princeton-Humboldt Strategic Partnership and the Australian National University.
